

Why We Need Tech Sessions By Kate O'Leary

Tick tock, Tick tock (not to be confused with the overly competitive social media app) I am waiting for another happy dog event. Tick tock, Tick tock, I am waiting for the rain to stop, because this is Georgia and that is winter here. Tick tock, Tick tock, I know someone who is waiting for parts for his Healey to arrive from England, Australia, or Moss Motors.

We spend a lot of our time waiting and watching the clock, or the calendar, for something to happen. What would happen if ing pizza is almost as satisfying as disaswe reached outside our personal comfort zone to someone who might need some of our knowledge or an extra set of hands to complete their own project?

One of the best activities we, as a club, offer is the tech session. Someone with a Healey problem and a good source for BBQ, coffee and donuts, or a gourmet lunch, will ask for help and voila! Something miraculous happens -- friendships are formed or solidified and a car gets fixed and heads out onto the open road.

This is important for two reasons. Firstly, as time goes by, the repair places for our little British cars are closing as the skilled mechanics retire or move on. Secondly, gaining the confidence to repair and drive your car anywhere results in more enjoyment as your skills for your car become more extensive.

Sometimes a tech session morphs into a troubleshooting session. When you have several experienced Healey mechanics, debate is inevitable. (It's the coil!) At that point, you should offer them iced tea and step back. This is the South, they aren't supposed to drink anything else. A consensus

will be reached and repairs made, or the team of experts will generate a list of the required parts for the repair, since nothing you bought will suffice. You will be unable to read the list because it is written in cursive and grease smudges.

I have learned a lot as I attend the tech sessions with the Healey club. I learned how to reassemble the suspension structure in my Jensen Healey, bleed the brakes, replace a broken carburetor gasket, remove and reattach the alternator, and swapping out a worn belt for a new one. Tech sessions can be held anywhere, I learned these things in a parking lot in Lake Tahoe, a street in Knoxville, a garage in Marietta (my tech session) and a tech session at SEClassic many years ago.

Chipping in to help is a hallmark of our club. We have a long tradition os getting grease under our fingernails and working together to fix what's wrong. This year, if you join the tech sessions, you can make a difference for your friends. And you will learn more about why it brings us all togeth-

My LBC does Not leak oil Its sweating Power Surges

Tech Corner By Barry Rosenberg

By the time this is printed and read, the holidays are over. I hope every one had a great Thanksgiving, Hanukkah, Christmas and New Year or any other holiday you celebrate, such as Festivus.

Your LBC should be asleep in it's bed and settled for the long winter's nap. NOT! There is no reason you can't drive and enjoy your car during the winter months. A little extra care and precaution and away you can go. Obviously, you do not want to drive them when there is snow or ice predicted.

Most counties and cities will use a brine solution on the roads a few days before the slippery weather arrives. If you watch the road surfaces, you can tell where and when they do this. Don't drive your car during this period. After the snow and ice melts, give it a few days, especially if there is some rain, and the roads will be safe enough to drive.

I am not talking about not being slippery any more, I am talking about the brine having been washed away and should not present any problems for our cars. They rust away bad enough on their own that they need no brine to help them convert back to nature. If in doubt about your drive, stop by the quarter car wash and rinse off the bottom and around the wheel wells.

If you do plan to drive your LBC frequently during the winter months, there is very little you need to do differently than the rest of the level and year. Oil does not need to be changed just because it gets cold outside. If it your yearly time, then by all means do the change. Yall do know that oil does not need to be changed every 2,00 to 3,000 miles. It easily lasts 5,000 be better.

Winter Preparations

I recommend you use the same weight oil all the time as there is no reason to change to a "winter" oil and "summer"oil. Even I believe that technology has improved in oils. I won't tell you what you should use but will tell you I still use Shell Rotella 15/40 weight. Just make sure your oil contains ZDDP as part of it's chemical make-up and is not a separate additive.

For winter preparation, should you not be planning to drive your car, there are a few things you can do. None are very complicated. First thing I recommend is to fill your gas tank as full as you can. Non-ethanol gas is best and is easily found now. As some of the volatile components do evaporate during long storage times in a poorly sealed container, like your gas tank, filling with a higher octane will give you a slightly better fuel when you start driving again.

While at the filling station, I highly recommend you pour a fuel stabilizer in the tank, before pumping the gas. I also like a can of BG44K in the tank. Then drive home as this will put treated gas in your carbs. If you do not have an air compressor at home, inflate your tires a few pounds over normal. I regularly use 32 pounds but would recommend about 40 if your drive home is short. The higher pressure will help keep your tires from flat spotting while they sit.

Make sure your coolant is filled to the proper level and with some anti-freeze in it. I use a 25% anti-freeze and 75% water. If your car will be parked outside under a cover, you could use a 50/50 mix. But in warmer times, water cools best so the lower percentage will be better.

Most batteries no longer can be checked for water level, but if your can, check it and top it off with a little distilled water or well water from your fridge. Our well water goes thru two filters plus the fridge filter, total of three filtrations, and has no water system additives. Distilled water is available from any grocery store, used for home steam mops. So, look in the cleaning aisle if you don't find it with the water. Or maybe it is already in your cleaning them year round. For a very long time, they closet at home, mine is.

If you will not be using the car at all during the couple of winter months, I recommend removing the battery terminals and cleaning them and the battery posts. Make sure your battery is charged and coat the posts and terminals with petroleum jelly or battery spray form the auto parts store.

Not much else is required to have your car ready for the next time you want to drive it. You have taken care of the oil, gas, tires and battery. I am not a big fan of trickle charges but if you are and you feel safe using them, by all means do so. But, I would still disconnect the battery.

Winter Preparations

Notice I did not say to clean and detail your car, not necessary just to let it sit. Wait until you are ready to start driving it again and then do the detailing, if that is your thing. Dust will get under a car cover and in the interior so why clean it twice?

We never parked our cars for any winter naps. When we had LBCs, we would drive were all we had to drive. Well them and a VW Bus that had zero heat. At least our LBCs had some heat and defrost.

So, until next year, hope to see yall somewhere soon. Maybe we got together during the holidays at one of the club parties. If not watch for a tech session at my home shop like in the past; tune ups, hot dogs, burgers and friends. Happy New Year!!!

For a metal to corrode, the following elements must be present: moisture, electron acceptor such as oxygen and a LBC. When moisture comes into contact with LBC, chemical reaction immediately begins to take place that quickly oxidizes the iron in steel, turning the iron into iron-oxide (the chemical name for rust). While iron is the most reactive metal, and therefore corrodes faster than most, all metals are susceptible to oxidation.



Corrosion Prevention

- 1. Keeping the up LBC painted metal surfaces limits the metal from exposure to oxygen, thus preventing corrosion or at least slowing the process.
- 2. Dehumidify, A humid environment increases moisture in the air. Living in S/E USA well, good luck with that. Keeping your LBC in a garage does help.
- 3. Keep It Clean, Excess dirt & grime can accelerate the corrosion process in your LBC.

Corrosion is an inescapable truth for anyone with a LBC. But knowing how it happens is the key to running interference on rust.
