While Rick, John and I were admiring a massive '62 Chrysler New Yorker station wagon, the owner approached. After chatting a while we realized he owns two 1967 BJ8s that his dad bought for him and his brother when the were in their early teens as a means for them to learn to work on cars and have something to drive in high school. This station wagon was Senate Minority Leader Everett McKinley Dirksen's campaign car. Then there was the "Hey, wait a minute" moment between John and the owner when they realized that John had sold his fami-

ly their turquoise Ford Falcon, which he still has. Then we learned that the owner, Robert Dirksen has been head of engineering for one of my newly-acquired machine-builder accounts (part of role transition I'm in the midst of at work).

You all might be able to help Robert. His BJ8 was wrecked in the front right side many years ago. It was "repaired", but not very well. The shock mount is angled back (and possibly upward) and someone welded a couple of studs to mount the shock. He wants to replace the frame section from just ahead of the motor mount tower to (and including at least a portion of) the cross brace (under the radiator) including the shock towers and wishbone arm attachment points. If you have - or know of - a front right section of frame, please let me know and I will share the info with Robert. Also, if it makes more sense (structurally) to go further back on the frame rail, that would



ATLANTA — A quarter mile south of the Sandy Springs city limits, a few hundred car enthusiasts enjoyed classic hot rods and fall weather Oct. 27 at the Chastain Park Auto Show.

The Chastain Park Conservancy, a community nonprofit with a mission to maintain and enhance the 268-acre park, came up with the idea for an outdoor auto show during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Now in its fourth year, the Chastain Park Auto Show brought dozens of young families and their children to the Red Lot across from taled it. Cadence Bank Amphitheater.

While Chastain Memorial Park and its Conservancy operate in the city of Atlanta, more than 3.2 million people from Metro Atlanta and around the country visit the park each year.

The Conservancy says it ensures the park's amenities are clean, safe and green for the diverse community it serves.

Karen Meinzen McEnerny, former Sandy Springs City Council member, submitted her award-winning 1963 Austin Healey 3000 BJ7 Mark II Sports Convertible into the auto show Oct. 27 for the first time.

McEnerny, known during her years as an elected official for tree advocacy, said it took she said. The Chastain Park Conservancy some convincing for her to take "Lucky Lady" out of her garage.

She said organizers of the Chastain Park Auto Show approached her earlier this year about submitting her Austin Healey at the show and placed the classic in the six-car Inner Circle.

The Austin Healey 3000 is a British sports car built from 1959 to 1967. Records show only around 6,100 of the Mark II BJ7 sports convertibles were built in August 1962.

The story of "Lucky Lady" spans two restorations over more than five decades in the McEnerny family.

Bob McEnerny, Karen's brother, first restored the British sports car in 1971 after the family purchased it for her. In 1973, an atfault driver struck the front of the car and to-

The Austin Healey sat for more than 40 years in the McEnerny family garage before Karen was able to get it restored. She credits restorationist and Powder Springs resident George Pope with getting the first car she ever owned back on the road. Pope, who McEnerny calls "Michelangelo," completed the four-and-a-half-year restoration with an entirely new frame in 2017.

Since then, "Lucky Lady" has won a couple awards at auto shows in Savannah and Atlanta. McEnerny, the longtime southern Sandy Springs resident, took home the Chastain Park Auto Show's 2024 Best in Show award alongside Pope and her brother Rob.

"A rags to blue ribbon story over 53 years," passed six additional awards, while patrons enjoyed food trucks, dozens of additional classic hot rods and a beautiful fall day in north Atlanta.

Rosa McHugh, president of the Conservancy, said the Chastain Park Auto Show started out with around 75 cars in 2020.

After work over the summer and fall, McHugh said the Chastain Park Conservance.

The number of participating vehicles, whether they be all-electric 2024 Rivian R1S or a 1940s Ford Super DeLuxe, has more than doubled since the inaugural year, McHugh said.

Butler Tire, one of the Roswell Road (Ga. 9) landmarks as motorists cross from Atlanta into Sandy Springs, sponsored the nonprofit's annual fundraiser.

The free community event is one of a few initiatives and events that the Conservancy puts on to support and expand park operations.

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After work over the summer and fall, McHugh said the Chastain Park Conservancy will submit its comprehensive plan update to the City of Atlanta early next year. Some of the capital projects under consideration are streetscape and pedestrian safety improvements at park gateways, improvements to the under-developed Northwoods section and activation of the wooded Palisades area abutting Chastain Park Golf Course.

McHugh, who has led the Conservancy for about a decade, said community input and involvement are what she's looking for from neighbors.

You know the saying; nature abhors a vacuum? Well motor heads, car people, gearheads, or whatever you want to call those who love anything motorized have a similar problem. We abhor any open, vacant garage/workshop floor space. When we see a vacant spot on our workshop/garage floor, we MUST fill it. It can't stay vacant for long.

We have to find another tool, piece of equipment or G-D forbid, another car to fill that void. This theory represents me to a T. Here are some pictures of my shop. Notice, no free or vacant floor space. No wall space or open loft space either. Everywhere I look, there is stuff. All valuable, useful stuff. But the good part is, we know where every thing we need is located in our chaos.

Except for the one tool or part we loaned to someone whom we can't remember who or when. I recently went thru this with a large tool loaned to someone I knew who didn't return it until I posted on several different sites that I needed (wanted it) back ASAP. It didn't turn up until some weeks later and then it was returned in secret and hidden on the side of my shop. At least they hid it from anyone wanting to steal it that might by chance be driving by my place and see a big metal box that may contain a large slide hammer.

But, I digress. I had an open space, larger than a car. And I filled it. I found a 1979 MGB, built engine with supercharger, 8 spoke splined mag wheels, lowered and uprated suspension and new brakes. 5 speed trans, new top and interior (top may need to be replaced) and all the factory extras such as a new tonneau, boot cover, supports for the boot cover in a nice "horse hair" bag, jack and spare tire located in the carpeted trunk.

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The car fits right in, it hasn't run since 2013, the last year tag on the car. It filled my empty space to perfection. I think it needs clutch hydraulics rebuilt or replaced. And of course it will need lots of other work like flushing out the fuel system; rebuilding the brakes (they still feel and work great but who wants to take a chance), tires replaced (they look almost new) and many items I haven't thought about.

The pictures show a lot of chaos and confusion in my shop and it needs to be fixed. Therefore, I make myself a promise to get my butt in gear and fix it. I have lots of items for a flea market sale, I just don't have the interest in holding one. Therefore, if any one reading this wants some free stuff for their flea market, call me and come get it. There are vases, old electronic games, video games, books (I think there is a children's encyclopedia in there), magazines and a whole lot more. What doesn't get taken away will go to the dump.

I made the mistake of selling a few tools I hadn't used in years and standard for the course, I needed them shortly after the sale. No tools, books or toys will be sold or given away except those previously mentioned.

My shop is not dedicated to just cars. No, there is much other stuff there. Lawn maintenance equipment like a riding mower, a push mower, leaf blower, weed wacker, fertilizer spreader, etc, etc all take up space. A 1967 TR4A IRS (sat in a real old barn since 1975 and does not run) sits on my scissors lift. A Bugeye Sprite I really need to finish for a customer, shelves with parts (not all are useful and not all car related. There are tubs of electrical and plumbing items stored on shelves.

When you do most of your own home repairs, you will accumulate parts for that. And lets not forget the special tools you need. Paint brushes and rollers, tubing benders, flareing kits and so much more. But is there a car person who doesn't like accumulating tools and stuff?

The pictures don't show much of the non auto stuff. I took up woodworking 50 years ago as I did not want to work on cars 7 days a week. I have accrued several nice wood working items that take up space. Hidden amongst the stuff is a sliding compound miter saw, router table (5 more routers in a cabinet), a 16" wide planer, a 10" table saw with attachments, a drill press and many other tools. There is also a home built woodworkers table. Yes, they are different than other tables.

Two tall metal cabinets contain more hand tools and small parts. Several vibrating tools, all for wood working please, that can cut or sand wood or car bodies. Sanders a plenty both electrical and battery powered. Lets not forget wood for future projects. I have the remains of an \$80,000 load of 2" thick rough cut cherry from 6" wide up to 16" wide and about 8' long. It takes all my remaining strength to move one 6" wide board from the loft to my saw so I can cut the board up to use for smoking meats. This was given to me by Patty's old boss, Jim Howard, from Atlanta Hardwoods over 15 years ago.

Walls have either shelves or peg board covered with tools and small hardware items. I have hundreds of different size screws, nuts and bolts although I need to go buy a size I need but don't have. How is it possible I don't have what I need? Something has to give so I can actually work in my shop. I haven't been

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able to do any wood working in a long time and I miss it.

So, if you want some free stuff for a yard sale or as cheap gifts, come on up and browse. I would like room to work on the MGB and make it a safe running car before spring time. And I have an engine to build as well. Here are some pictures of my chaos.









As you can see, open, free space is very limited. Much more in the shop, and there will be Barry Rosenberg no room to walk and obviously, no place to work. Stuff has to be eliminated or moved. Do Peachtree MG Registry you have any free space I can borrow?

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The purpose of this article is to let all car nuts know they are not alone, there are many of us in this same boat. It is also to give me a kick in the butt to rectify my personal situation so I can get back to work.

Christmas and New Year are over by now so you should be out in your shop working. I hope to have a British car running soon and hope to see yall some where soon.

Well, the weather outside is terrible, cold and wet and I have been with a cold for three weeks now. What I am trying not to say is that my shop looks exactly the same as in my last article. I have not been out there in over a month other than to move a key lime tree in and out to get some sun. Hopefully, it will produce some limes this year.

So, I have been thinking about how I came to be an old British car mechanic. How did we all get interested in cars? Some were lucky enough to have had parents interested in cars and you were involved enough it rubbed off on you. Some may have had the love of cars and things mechanical go back several generations in your family. And some of us just fell into it.

No one in my family, other than me, had or has any interest in cars or mechanics. Sad to

say, I am not passing it to any of my children. I don't remember much about my grandparents' interests other than they were involved in liquor stores and grocery stores. 
